

Xisanqi Migrant Worker Activity Center in Beijing Presents a Series of Programs

Youth English Class – Zigen’s Xisanqi Migrant Worker Activity Center begins its adult English class on September 20, 2010. Due to space limitations, only 16 students from over 40 applicants could be accepted into the inaugural class. Jia Xiaoming from Stanford University will be teaching the class on a volunteer basis.



Community Recreation – Zigen’s Xisanqi Migrant Worker Activity Center added an outdoor table tennis table on August 9, 2010, attracting both adults and children from the neighborhood to play. The Activity Center provides migrant workers from the community with sports equipment, encouraging them to work out there during their free time and enriching life in the community.



Children’s Computer Class Ends – The Children’s Computer Class at Zigen’s Xisanqi Migrant Worker Activity Center ended on July 31, 2010. The class was designed for migrant worker children in the community, especially targeting students from fourth grade and above. The various subjects taught during the computer class allowed students with different levels of skill to learn something from the class. Students learned useful information and created their very own computer images to keep.

“Little Volunteers” – In order to enrich summer activities and increase ties between Zigen’s Activity Center and children in the community, the Xisanqi Migrant Worker Activity Center presents the program “Little Volunteers.” Program participants become “little librarians”, create publicity for the “Little Volunteers” program, and do whatever they can to help others and aid the work at the Activity Center.

Summer Youth Classes – Youth class participants were mainly students from fifth to seventh grades. Classes ran from July 1, 2010 to July 31, 2010 and included subjects in literature, English language, life skills, theater, and film studies. The classes aimed to broaden students’ knowledge and impart an understanding of life’s many facets. At the same time, students received guidance in these classes on the various challenges commonly encountered during adolescence.

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
